Greetings From Our President

A Year in Review

I recently listened to a speaker share that “the fabric of trust is made of up safety and connections”. The individuals and families that we have the privilege of serving have experienced broken trust and trauma due to lack of safety and hurtful connections.

As I was walking from my car to the office this morning, Jimmy (age 8) ran over from the sand pile and insisted on a hug. Jimmy came into our residential program 6 months ago and it's taken this length of time for him to learn that he is safe. He is building healthy connections with safe and trusted adults. It's great to see him playing now and enjoying being a little boy!

In each of our program areas, our highest priority is physical and emotional safety. We work with our students and their families, foster families, intervention summer camp and challenge weekend youth, and even some of our facilitated guest groups to learn more about the relational obstacles that need to be overcome, to address their trauma and learn to build trust.

As we moved out of Covid 'pandemic' realities, establishing connections was a lifeline for many of our clients – especially youth in foster care homes and residential programs. Helping each person to know their value and experience relationships affirming their worth is key to lasting connections.

2023 was a year of 'building safety' as we invested in staff training to further understand the behavior responses that trauma produces, worked on many of our over 50-year-old campus facilities, paved internal campus roads, and fully launched the change to a Type 1 'community' well system. This has all been made possible through the completion of our capital campaign and generous donations to our Eagle Fund.

As you read Ashton's story, he truly exemplifies the power of safety and connection. He clearly articulated that he entered our residential program scared and lonely. Through his efforts to learn, combined with our providing him the tools of safety and therapeutic relational connections, today he is an amazing, vibrant young man who is fully connected with his new family and community.

Bob Werkema and The Cokes' stories share how connecting to Eagle Village will have an impact on our donors and volunteers' lives, in addition to the connections made with our youth.

2023 has been a year of building trust in many areas with youth and families. We are excited about the opportunities that we are launching in 2024, and the trust that will be built and grow, as we move forward.

LIFE THROUGH THEIR EYES: ASHTON

When I got to Eagle Village, I felt really overwhelmed because I had been in foster care since I was three years old. The first few days were super tiring, and I was really anxious since I had gone through a lot of placements before. I was worried that I wouldn't fit in or be accepted. There was a time when I even hid under the table during lunch because I didn't want to talk to anyone and felt like everyone was judging me. I kept my bangs over my face so that people couldn't fully see me. I remember wearing the same Mega Man costume every day and never wanting to wear something else. I don't wear it anymore, but I keep it because it reminds me of my past.

Whenever someone tried to help, it made me upset because I didn't believe in myself or trust others. But the staff at Eagle Village helped me learn how to deal with my anxiety. I started by listening to music and swinging for hours. Slowly, I began to come out of my shell and talk to the other kids more. Over time, I became more comfortable talking to my peers and built friendships that are still important to me. I learned how to calm myself down because the staff showed me that I needed to work on myself. With their support, I discovered how important it is to take care of my feelings and focus on my growth.

I spent about two and a half years at Eagle Village, and I changed from a scared kid who struggled with everything to a confident person who can make friends, do well in school, and try new things. I even taught an anime drawing class for the staff as my Heart Stage project!

After working with the staff at Eagle Village, I went to live with a foster family, who ended up adopting me. Now, I'm almost a straight 'A' student! I'm in my school choir and I'm not afraid to sing in front of hundreds of people. My love for art, especially drawing anime characters and creating my own designs, has really grown, and I enjoy sharing my creations with others.

To this day, Eagle Village continues to be there for me.

of those children, birth to 17 years old, were removed from their homes and put into foster care, shelters or residential placement.

EAGLE VILLAGE IS A PLACE OF SOLUTIONS. This is our 56th year of serving and equipping youth and families for success. We provide a full continuum of services for Michigan’s abused and neglected youth that continually grow and adapt to meet the changing needs of our communities. We offer life changing solutions that compassionately meet individuals where they are as a whole person; mind, body and spirit.

PROBLEM IDENTIFIED

The statistics in Michigan show the reality that thousands of children experience abuse and/or neglect in their homes. The outcome is children who do not feel safe in their homes and have lost trust in the adults who should be protecting them. They live with the fear of not knowing what each day will bring. This population has a high rate of homelessness which leads to a life of lost potential, unrealized value and living without hope.

THOUGHTFUL SOLUTIONS

Eagle Village is solution focused to meet Michigan’s mental health issues. We use trauma informed therapy, occupational therapy, experiential activities and create individual treatment plans to help each youth work through their trauma. Eagle Village is committed to improving lives and futures. We want each child to realize their value. A concept we teach is that their past doesn’t determine their future. Our goal is to create intentional paths and teach them the skills to help them navigate life; one of change, determination and hope.

PROGRAMS

TRAUMA ASSESSMENTS

Children ages 3-17, experience a comprehensive assessment, by a multi-disciplinary team, to provide answers to behavioral or mental health issues. A plan to help stabilize behaviors is the outcome. We have initiated trauma assessments with adults as well.

CAMPS AND INTERVENTION PROGRAMS

For children ages 9-17, we offer summer camps for youth who need help managing behavior and emotions. We also offer year-round youth respite weekends and family intervention sessions. We work with school systems on school character development, anti-bullying and resiliency.

RESIDENTIAL PROGRAM

Children ages 8-17, who have been taken away from their homes because of abuse and/or neglect, live on our 681-acre campus. Staff therapists, occupational therapist, experiential and direct care staff use trauma informed therapy to work with youth through their trauma. We see them transform as they feel valued, cared for and safe.

FOSTER CARE AND ADOPTION PROGRAM

Children ages 0-20, who are wards of the state, are placed in foster homes that we license. We work with families to reunify whenever possible. We have ongoing training for the parents, monitor foster families and complete adoptions.

GROUP AND MISSION RETREATS

A multi-purpose camp setting for team building and mental and emotional resilience training. Hosting schools, churches, college groups, and other organizations to advance their missions by providing meeting space, lodging and adventure facilities.

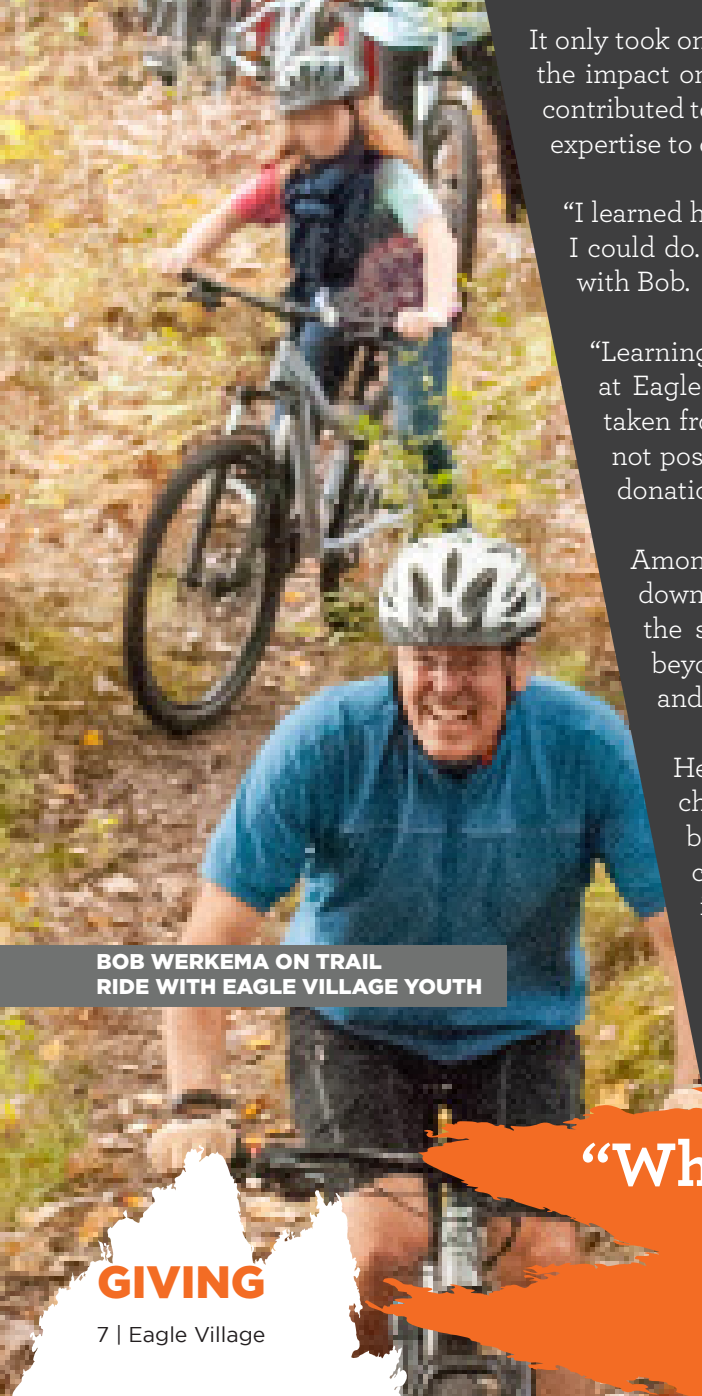

BOB WERKEMA ON TRAIL
RIDE WITH EAGLE VILLAGE YOUTH

It only took one visit for Bob Werkema to see the significance of Eagle Village and the impact on abused and neglected children. As a volunteer and donor, he has contributed to our mission in remarkable ways, particularly by utilizing his cycling expertise to offer youth an experience that every child deserves.

“I learned how to ride a bike! I can actually do it! It’s something I never thought I could do. I can’t wait to do it again,” one youth said after his first bike lesson with Bob.

“Learning how to ride a bike is a rite of passage,” Bob said. “Some children at Eagle Village have never ridden a bicycle. Most of their childhood was taken from them. Something as common as learning how to ride a bike was not possible, until we started the bike program with the help of a generous donation from another volunteer.”

Among Bob’s cherished moments with the youth was a thrilling descent down a hill, during which one youth briefly lost control but quickly applied the skills learned from Bob to regain stability. “Cycling pushes them beyond their comfort zones, which is both rewarding for me to witness and somewhat anxiety-inducing,” Bob laughed.

He further noted that engaging with children who have faced significant challenges has been a profound blessing for him, and he hopes it has been equally beneficial for them. “The chance to connect with these children and share lighthearted moments, cultivates a sense of involvement. Instead of feeling pity, I aim to treat them with respect, helping them navigate their challenges simply by being present and engaged in their lives. This experience has been incredibly fulfilling for me.”

THE JOY OF GIVING

Ed and Lola Coke were introduced to Eagle Village by friends, Bob and Sarah Werkema. They decided they wanted to make a difference.

Their gift created the Secret Santa Shop where each youth selects a name for the gift exchange and has to keep it secret for an entire day! We set up the Secret Santa Shop with a variety of gifts and a wrapping station. Each youth carefully picks a gift for a house mate and wraps it for the gift exchange. Giving a gift at Christmas is a new experience for many of our youth and the excitement is visible. They are so thoughtful when selecting gifts, wrapping paper and bows. They are also able to select gifts for siblings if they are going on a home visit or a hostess gift if they are invited by a family to have Christmas with them.

“Eagle Village kids may have never had the experience of giving anything, because they never had the means to do it,” explained Ed. “The Christmas Gift Exchange gives them the opportunity to think about what their friends and family would like, shop, wrap the gifts and then, give.”

Ed and Lola have added another element to the holidays at Eagle Village. They come to our special tradition of Village Christmas as Mr. and Mrs. Claus. They fondly remember their first interaction with the children at the Village Christmas event, which allows our youth to showcase their singing and acting talents before an audience that genuinely supports them. Lola expressed, “It’s very moving to see the care and compassion the Eagle Village staff have for the kids. Just seeing those kids at the Village Christmas performance was amazing.”

The Coke’s have provided something so important to our youth, and that is positive, childhood memories - which many of our youth do not have. “The difficulties they faced are just hard to comprehend, but somebody needs to walk with them on that journey, and the Village is doing that quite well,” said Ed. “Volunteering and giving to the Village provides the means to help these kids succeed.”

December 2024 will be Ed’s third year as Santa Claus and Lola’s second year of playing the role of Mrs. Claus.

PROGRAMS BEGINNING IN 2024

Children's Advocacy Center - January 2024

Ages 3 - 17 | This program offers work with a multi-disciplinary team to complete forensic interviews for children who have been reported as a victim of abuse.

This ensures that children's voices are heard and carefully responded to in a safe, nonthreatening environment. An advocate is provided for the child and non-offending family members to work through this process.

Day Treatment Program - October 2024

Ages 12-17 | This program is for children who have court involvement and recurring suspensions or expelled from school.

This is an intensive educational and treatment program designed to serve youth in Osceola County and Mecosta County. The program goals include development of self-esteem, decision making and problem solving skills, social skills, and productive behaviors, and improvement of academic and vocational skills.

Independent Living Program Plus - October 2024

Ages 16-19 | A supportive, transitional program - rooted in community living and youth development, that helps youth prepare for full Independent Living.

Services include education planning, employment preparation and attainment, financial literacy/budgeting, life skills training.
